Playground Visit ~ Excursión al parque infantil

A visit to a park with a playground would offer a perfect opportunity to apply this new vocabulary in a real life context. Since parks and playgrounds are a low cost trip out, taking a visit at the start and at the end of this series of videos would offer an excellent stimulus and an opportunity at the end to apply all of the vocabulary learned over the course of the sessions.

On your final park visit, you can use the I-Spy vocabulary sheet to help revisit words and encourage children to give them a try themselves.

Real life superheroes ~ Superheroes en la vida real



Use the accompanying resource to give children an opportunity to see the names of some of the superheroes we have in our community, but in Spanish too. Children can practice letter formation by tracing the words in both languages, colour in the pictures and hear the vocabulary with adult assistance reading the phonetic spelling underneath the Spanish word.

Superhero Masks ~ Máscaras de superheroe

This session's song is perfect for some dressing up so dig out the costumes if you have them or make your own superhero mask and let children decorate it however they like to feel just like a superheroe en el parque infantíl.

You could use:

White card, elastic, black marker, scissors, coloured pens, pencils or crayons and any other craft items.

Draw a mask template on the white card, or find a printable one online. Have children decorate the template first, leave to dry if needed, cut out and secure elastic for them to wear their mask.

Using the action words from this session's song, play a simple game of Simon Says to reinforce the action vocabulary.

run ~ corre (koh-rreh) jump ~ salta (sahl-tah)

Playground Small World Play Pequeño parque infantil

Using a large tuff tray or tub, create a small world play activity, you could include:

> A small piece of astroturf or fake grass Plastic trees Playmobil or similar figures

For the play equipment:

Wooden blocks / natural items set up as play equipment Plastic play equipment - if you don't have any in house, it's always worth asking parents!

Play equipment made with cardboard tubes/boxes

As an additional creative element, the children could create their own play equipment for the activity from junk modelling items. This is perfect for encouraging creativity and improving those much needed fine motor skills.
